On Monday, 19 June 2023, I had the pleasure of meeting with the new owners of the Winsted United Methodist Church now known as the Laurel City Playhouse and Concert Hall. John Noone and Alla Kravchenko are wonderful people who have a vision for the arts in Winsted.

The Winsted United Methodist Church (WUMC) congregation vacated the premises and turned over the control of the property to the New York Annual Conference on 1 February 2022. We began worshipping at the St. Andrews Masonic Lodge at 27 Wheeler Street in Winsted.

On 6 June 2022, The Conference and the local congregation conducted a decommissioning of the 630 Main Street property, walked up High Street, turned left onto Fairview Avenue, and continued to the Mason's Lodge where we were and welcomed with open arms.

The relationship we had with the Masons was wonderful. Even so, we could not financially survive the new arrangement. So, after six months and many discussions and negotiations, we merged with the Pleasant Valley Methodist Church (PVUMC) in Barkhamsted on 1 October 2022.

This has been another wonderful association. Again, we were welcomed with open arms and assimilated into the life of the Pleasant Valley Church.

When we departed the old building, many things had to be left behind...old financial and church records, furniture, books, music, and many unfinished projects.

I connected with John and Alla, and we spent about four hours sharing thoughts, concerns and stories. I supplied them with a list of former workmen who had done different maintenance and repairs of the church over the last few years. I also gave them a big bunch of keys that Pastor Adeline had left with me.

We talked of some of the items that may have historical significance for the town. Possibly the Winchester Historical Society may be interested. We also discussed the possibility of helping the Society with a display and history of religion in Winsted, including all the houses of worship and the rise and fall of various religions in the area.

One of the questions I had was what to do with the clothing bins. The options were to discontinue the pickups, change the income to their accounts or keep it as is. John said that they have no problem with the arrangement as is, which means that we will continue to earn \$200.00 income every month.

Also, the Conference has requested an inventory of religious items that we left behind, that Conference would retrieve after John and Alla have gone through them. They are issuing an invitation to church members to help in deciding what goes and what stays. So, I am asking for any volunteers who may want to help.

Another question I had concerned all the music left behind. I have put out an email to Dave Zucker for help in this instance.

A box of Christmas tree ornamental glass bulbs have been brought to the PVUMC, depicting 200th birthday of the Methodism in Winsted in 1971. I am offering them up to the Winsted people as a memento and reminder of our ties to the Winsted community.

One thing that John and Alla want to do is install a memorial plaque commemorating the life of the church for all to see once the building is completely renovated.

5 fun facts about July

Though it might be a great time for some R&R, July also boasts an interesting history. As revelers soak up some sun this summer, they can ponder these fun facts about the month of July.

- 1. July is named after a person whose been famous for thousands of years. According to the Farmer's Almanac, Roman dictator Julius Caesar developed the precursor to the Gregorian calendar used today. Though that made him worthy of a month named in his honor, it didn't do much to protect him during his life, as Caesar was famously assassinated in 44 B.C.
- 2. July is a celebratory month for fans of revolution. American Independence Day (July 4) and Bastille Day (July 14), which commemorates the storming of the Bastille and the dawn of the French Revolution in 1789, are among the notable revolutionary moments celebrated in July.
- 3. Baseball historians know that many significant events in the game have taken place in July, and some records set in the month have withstood longer than others. On July 12, 1931, Mel Ott of the New York Giants hit his 100th career homerun, becoming the youngest player to reach that milestone. Ott was 22 years and 132 days old when he set the mark, which still stands today.

On July 20, 1969, American astronaut Neil Armstrong, after stepping onto the surface of the moon, declared, "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind."

On July 4, 1826, former presidents John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, who were once friends, then political rivals and, finally, friends again, passed away within hours of each other.
